PLANTS of INTEREST

Allocasuarinas - There are three species of allocasuarinas in the Parkland. The common name of these is 'Tamma'. Each species has male and female plants.

Eucalyptus - Many of the tallest plants are eucalyptus trees that take on a mallee form sprouting many trunks from a large ligno tuber base. The bark colours are best in autumn.

Others - Including wattles, grevilleas, droseras, malleucas and at least 7 species of orchids.


BIRDS and INSECT LIFE

Resident bird species Weebill, thornbills and honeyeaters are commonly seen and heard as is the Red-capped Robin.

Red-tailed Black Cockatoos roost in the taller trees and feed on the *Callitris roei*.

White-browed Babblers hop about in family groups and the Pied and Grey Butcher Birds may also be seen.

Two trap door spiders with Vulnerable Status are found in the Parkland. These use leaf litter to make their distinctive burrows.

Tamma Parkland is a rare jewel in the Shire of Merredin. Nearly 90% of the original bush within the Shire has been cleared for farming. The small pockets of natural bushland left are a vital refuge for many native plants and animals. Tamma Parkland is one of those refuges. It enables us to experience and enjoy the seasonal changes of the bush and learn about the creatures and plants that were here prior to European settlement.

Remember

Cool drink cans and bottles can trap small animals.

Rubbish looks awful. Take your rubbish with you.

Collecting wood damages the trees and takes away homes for insects, lizards and birds.

Take photos as collecting seeds and flowers is illegal.

Trail bikes and motorised vehicles are not allowed in the reserve.
