HOW TO GET TO Merredin

BY ROAD

Located at the crossroads to five Wheatbelt Self-Drive road trips, Merredin is a comfortable 2.5 hrs drive east of Perth and 3.5 hrs west of Kalgoorlie, following the National Trust WA's epic Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail from Mundaring, and the Public Silo Trail from Northam along the Great Eastern Highway. Alternatively, through Toodyay along the Pioneers' Pathway is quieter, less travelled sealed roads, following the early pioneers' stories in each town.



An RV Friendly Town, Merredin offers a FREE 24-hour stay for fully self-contained RVs at Merredin Peak Reserve, one of the Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail attraction sites. Enhance your stay with bushwalking trails, and a climb to the peak provides 360-degree views of Merredin and countryside. RV Dump Point is located at the Merredin Tourist Park on Oats Street. Potable water and a rubbish dumpster are available at the Central Wheatbelt Visitor Centre on Barrack Street.

E-VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

Merredin has two Tesla and as of November 2023 there will be two DC/Fast Chargers and one AC Charger with a standalone credit card payment in Barrack Street Car Park.



HISTORY OF Merredin

MERREDIN'S HISTORY

The Shire of Merredin acknowledges the Traditional Owners of the land, and pays our respects to Elders past, present and emerging.

Several Central Wheatbelt towns and local government districts are recognised as culturally significant lands for the Traditional Owners the Njaki Njaki Nyoongar people. The Njaki Njaki Aboriginal community continue to have strong connections and a spiritual relationship to these places including the ecological and geographical environment. Many granite outcrops, waterways, land formations, and flora and fauna within the region hold much cultural significance to the Traditional Owners through a continued relationship that spans over tens of thousands of years. It is thought that Merredin's name came from the Merritt tree (Eucalyptus urna - Urn Fruited Mallee) the Njaki Njaki people used to make spears from.

Assistant Surveyor Charles Hunt explored the area between 1864-66 in five journeys establishing tracks between waterholes. In 1865 Hunt built a series of dams and stone lined wells to supply water to travellers. His route became the York to Goldfields Road, which until the arrival of the railway, was the only link between the coast and the Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie Goldfields.

A permanent campsite was established at the waterhole at the base of Merredin Peak. First Gazetted as Merredin Peak Reserve 2914 on 19 March 1891, it included an inn and a police station. In 1893 the Perth to Kalgoorlie railway line came as far as Merredin, one mile south of the original campsite. Narrow gauge railway reached Merredin November 1893, when the town was relocated to the present site and surveyed in 1904 which established Merredin's future as a significant rail station and freight handling junction.



EARLY WATER CATCHMENT SCHEME MERREDIN PEAK AND RAILWAY DAM

Merredin's European history began as a rest stop and water point on-route to the prosperous Goldfields of Coolgardie and Kalgoorlie. A superior water catchment solution was needed, and a low rock wall was constructed between 1893-1896 around the base of Merredin Peak, which channelled rainwater from the rock to a spillway and into Merredin Railway Dam. This dam supplied water for the town and railway for steam engines until the construction of C.Y. O'Connor's water pipeline was completed in 1903 bringing water from Mundaring Weir, east of Perth to Mt Charlotte in Kalgoorlie. Today the Railway Dam along with additional dams make Merredin a water wise town. Merredin Peak is 354 m above sea level.

GRAIN GROWING

The Shire of Merredin includes the surrounding grain growing agricultural regions and the towns of Muntadgin to the south, Burracoppin to the east and Hines Hill to the west. Wheat is the state's major grain crop followed by barley, canola, oats, lupins and peas. The Co-operative Bulk Handling (CBH) Group is Australia's largest co-operative and a leader in the Australian grain industry, with Merredin operations extending along the value chain from grain storage, handling, transport, marketing and processing.



GREEN ENERGY

Merredin Solar Farm is located 12km south on the corner of Bruce Rock Road and Robartson Road on 462ha of former farming and grazing country. The solar array consists of approximately 360,000 Risen Energy panels mounted on a single axis tracking system. The site is adjacent to the Western Power Merredin Terminal Substation and connects to the substation at 220kV with an expected output of 281GWh of electricity annually, generating

enough energy to power approximately 42,000 homes.

Collgar Wind Farm is the largest wind farm in Western Australia making a huge contribution towards decreasing Western Australia's greenhouse gas emissions - equal to planting 1 million trees! There are 111 Wind Turbines on farming properties leased out for the project 25kms southeast of Merredin stretching over 18,000 hectares (180 square kms).



ATTRACTIONS & places to play



CENTRAL WHEATBELT VISITOR CENTRE (G5)

Start your journey with local advice, maps and guides on accommodation, attractions, events, dining out, tours, self-drive trails, day trips and seasonal wildflower hotspots. 1. MERREDIN HERITAGE TRAIL

Pick up your Welcome to Merredin & Heritage Walk Map from the Central Wheatbelt Visitor Centre and follow a 2km trail around Merredin's heritage listed buildings, including Cummins Theatre, Merredin Courthouse and Townhall. The trail map includes a detailed description of the building's architecture and historical significance to Merredin.

2. CUMMINS THEATRE (G4)

This beautifully restored theatre is classified by the National Trust of Australia (WA) and was entered on the Heritage Council of WA's State register of Heritage Places in 1995. Today it hosts a variety of regional touring productions, Morning Melodies and Merredin Repertory Club performances throughout the year. Don't miss an opportunity to see a show during your stay in Merredin.

3. MERREDIN MILITARY MUSEUM (G5)

Managed by a small but dedicated group of military buffs, this museum contains items credited to private individuals and public donations including many military vehicles in working order. This extensive collection from all conflicts features 'Huey' a former RAAF and Army Aviation Iroquois UH-1H helicopter from the Vietnam War. Entry fee applies. There are other WWII sites in and around Merredin and Nungarin district.

4. MERREDIN RAILWAY MUSEUM (G5)

Located in the historic Merredin Railway Station, the collections have enjoyed an interpretation upgrade. Maintained by a group of dedicated volunteers, this historic railway collection keeps alive this once major rail hub, its buildings, artefacts, rolling stock and steam engines. One of the prized possessions is an 1897 steam locomotive that hauled the Kalgoorlie Express from Perth to the Goldfields. Entry fee applies.

5. MERREDIN FINE ARTS STUDIO & GALLERY (G4)

Enjoy the hospitality of this group of creative and talented locals in their art space and gallery. Located in Queen Street, be sure to visit the artists on any Thursday 9am-2pm, or Saturday 9am-12pm.

6. MERREDIN SILO ART (B5)

FORM's Public Silo Trail has renewed grain silos in towns across regional Western Australia with massive artworks of world class murals by local and international artists. In 2017 urban artist Kyle Hughes-Odgers transformed four of the eight concrete silo cells at CBH Merredin. Through his characteristic geometric yet playful style, Kyle depicts the importance of the agricultural industry to Merredin and the Wheatbelt region with colours taken directly from the Wheatbelt's natural environment. A publication 'Stories from the Silo Towns' is available at Visitor Centres along the trail.

7. MERREDIN PEAK & RAILWAY DAM (I3)

Located 1.5km from town, the granite rock, Merredin Peak is a monolith, one single massive rock made from hard granite and exposed by erosion over millions of years. It is also a reserve and a prominent place for the Njaki Njaki Aboriginal people.

The European pioneering story of the engineering techniques of the early Water Catchment Scheme is visible in the built history of stone contour walls, a rock channel and spillway into Railway Dam and interpreted through National Trust (WA) Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail signage. A 24-hour site for fully self-contained RV's in a woodland setting. No fires, dogs permitted off leash.

8. WWII 2/1 AUSTRALIAN GENERAL HOSPITAL (I3)

Close by to Merredin Peak is the World War II concrete foundation slab remains of the 2/1 Australian General Hospital. A walk or short drive around this trail will explain this inland Army hospitals' significance to the war effort through National Trust (WA) interpretive signs.

9. NO.4 PUMP STATION (A6)

One of eight original pumping stations along CY O'Connor's water pipeline Merredin's No. 4 pump station is located 3km west of Merredin just off the Great Eastern Hwy. This once significant structure is now a stabilised ruin with National Trust (WA) Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail interpretive signs. No pedestrian access.

10. TOTADGIN CONSERVATION PARK (F8)

A short drive 14km south of Merredin on the Bruce Rock Road, this granite rock in a natural woodland setting features one of early surveyor Charles Hunt's historic hand built stone wells. A Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail site with walk trails leading to a mini 'wave' rock formation. National Trust interpretive signs and springtime wildflowers make it an ideal picnic spot. Wheelchair access to picnic shelter from one of the two car park entries. A Dept. Parks and Wildlife Conservation Reserve, dogs not permitted. BBQ facilities.


11. COLLGAR WIND FARM (J8)

Located 25km southeast of Merredin, the wind farm covers 18,000 hectares of farmland and contains 111 turbines which generate enough power to supply 125,000 homes with renewable energy. An information shelter provides the wind farms renewable energy story located on Bulls Head Road.

12. MERREDIN SOLAR FARM (F8)

Located 10km south of Merredin on the Merredin-Bruce Rock Road is the impressive solar array of this Wheatbelt renewable energy project. Merredin Solar Farm has a generation capacity of 100MW and is the largest solar farm in Western Australia. With an expected output of 281GWh of



electricity annually, generating enough energy to power approximately 42,000 homes.

13. NO.1 RABBIT PROOF FENCE

Located 2km east of Burracoppin, the No. 1 Rabbit Proof Fence was the first of three rabbit proof barriers against the spread of rabbits threatening the agricultural industry of WA. It is the longest continuous fence in the world and represents enormous endeavour by a handful of dedicated individuals. The No.1 fence runs from Cape Keraudren to the north of Port Hedland to Starvation Boat Harbour near Hopetoun on the south coast.

14. SEASONAL WILDFLOWERS

Over 980 species of wildflowers can be found within the Merredin Shire. The annual display is one of the most sought-after springtime attractions in the region. The enchanting winter orchids start off the season in June/July followed by carpets of everlasting by August with spring flowering trees and shrubs in the woodland reserves and roadsides.

15. PARKS, PLAYGROUNDS & RESERVES

Before heading off, pack a picnic or grab some delicious food and drink from a choice of several cafés and food outlets.

APEX PARK (F5)

The number one rest stop for your travelling family. The park includes a children's playground, skate park, picnic shelter, BBQ & toilets. Located on the west end of Barrack Street all enclosed with secure fencing. Dogs not permitted.

DOG PARK (G4)

Not forgetting your four-legged travel companion/s, there are two secure fenced and gated exercise runs with water points at this top spot for canines small and large visiting Merredin. Located adjacent to the Merredin Library in Coronation Street. Dogs permitted off-leash in exercise areas.

LENIHAN PARK (F6)

A dedicated children's outdoor nature play space with logs and rocks to scramble over includes a family picnic shelter inside secure fencing. Located on east side of South Avenue opposite St Mary's Primary School.

PIONEER PARK (G5)

A memorial park with sculptures dedicated to the agricultural pioneers of Merredin and district. Car park access from Great Eastern Highway with access to the Railway Museum and Military Museum and a short walk to Merredin CBD via a railway pedestrian crossing. Dogs permitted on leash. No access for Caravans or RV Parking.

ROY LITTLE PARK (F4)

An extensive grassed park accessed by paved pathways to a central duckpond with fountain and picnic shelters. Parking in King Street near the Shire admin building and adjacent to the Long Tan Memorial Reflection Pond. Wheelchair and mobility scooter access. Dogs permitted on leash.

TAMMA PARKLAND (F7)

Located on west side of South Avenue at the town's southern boundary, this nature reserve hosts seasonal wildflower displays.

An interpretive walk trail wanders amongst delightful natural bushland where the 1.2km trail reveals the secrets of the local flora and fauna. Dogs permitted on leash.



DAY TRIPS

From Merredin



TOTADGIN CONSERVATION PARK, MERREDIN SOLAR FARM, NO.4 PUMP STATION & MERREDIN SILO ART

South and west of Merredin take in four key attractions ranging from natural history, green energy, Golden Pipeline heritage and massive Public Silo art.

Distance 40kms return on sealed roads. Allow a few hours.

Take South Avenue/Bruce Rock Road 14kms south of Merredin to Totadgin Rock. Two car park entries on right side of road. For granite rock and natural history devotees, follow rock trail markers to the mini wave formation and adjacent natural bushland. Interpretive signs, BBQ and picnic tables with disabled access available from Hunt's Well car park. Good walking shoes, hat and water bottle recommended. Level of difficulty is low but allow 45mins for the walk. A Dept. of Parks and Wildlife Conservation Reserve, dogs not permitted.

Return via Robartson Road past the massive solar array at the Merredin Solar Farm project and Merredin Power Substation back to the Great Eastern Highway. See three generations of water pumping stations 4kms west of Merredin at the original No.4 Pumping Station, part of the National Trust (WA) Golden Pipeline Heritage Trail. A further 2km on, stop into the Merredin CBH Silo Art lay-by with Public Silo Trail interpretation signage on your return to Merredin.

RABBIT PROOF FENCE, WESTONIA & HOOD-PENN MUSEUM

See sections of the original No. 1 Rabbit Proof Fence now called the State Barrier Fence visiting Boodalin Soak, Edna May Mine gold operation, Sandford Rocks and the significant collection at Hood-Penn Museum.

Distance approx. 170kms return on sealed roads with some unsealed sections. Allow a half day.

Take the Great Eastern Highway east to Burracoppin, the former headquarters for the State Barrier Fence. Take the Burracoppin-Campion Road north 20kms from Burracoppin where sections of the original netting fence line can be seen from the roadside. Turning east on Ten Mile Gate Road and north along the Rabbit Proof Fence Road for more original netting fence line and a stop to see a unique in-ground water supply at Tank No.24 off to the lefthand side of the road. At Leeman Road turn east to the Warralakin Road and travel south approx. 2kms and onto Stoneman Road stopping into Boodalin Soak with an original stone lined well.

Call into the Edna May Mine 1km north of Westonia and take a walk up the pedestrian ramp to the viewing platform for a birds eye view of this operating gold mine. Westonia greets you with a fascinating 1920's historic retail streetscape and an extensive historical family collection at the Hood-Penn Museum in the old Club Hotel building. Sandford Rocks Reserve 10kms northeast is a great picnic spot to stop and explore the rock and

woodlands. Sandford Rocks it is a Dept. Parks and Wildlife Nature Reserve, dogs not permitted.

On your return to Merredin stop in at the Walgoolan Pioneer Gazebo and 5km east of Burracoppin at the Rabbit Proof Fence Road intersection is an interpretive shelter on the south side of the highway. Off the Goldfields Road, south of the highway is one of Charles Hunts wells and an interpretive station.

Westonia has a café and store.

COLLGAR WINDFARM TRAIL

The first of two Wheatbelt green energy projects located on agricultural land in the Shire of Merredin, this massive undertaking consists of 111 wind turbines.

Distance approx. 70kms return on mainly sealed roads with an unsealed section. Allow a half day

Head 2kms east on the Great Eastern Highway to the Naremben Road turnoff and as you travel south the turbines come into view and you can see the extent of the largest wind farm in Western Australia. Continue east onto Bulls Head Road where some of the massive towers are close to the roadside. An interpretive shelter on the left-hand side of the Bulls Head Road is a good place to stop and learn more about the renewable energy industry. Continue till you meet Springwell Valley Road and turn north to meet the Great Eastern Highway at Burracoppin, turning west on the return to Merredin.

WILDFLOWER TRAIL – SEASONAL

During a good wildflower season expect to see carpets of everlasting on the roadsides and in bushland reserves around granite rocks. Include Mangowine Homestead on the return if time permits. Distance approx. 120-160kms return on mainly sealed roads, some unsealed sections into reserves or attractions. Allow a half to full day.

Follow Telfer Avenue north from Merredin to the corner of Merredin-Chandler Road and Talgomine Reserve Road, the

bushland on the left is a wildflower hot-spot so get out and explore. Turn onto Talgomine Reserve Road to Talgomine Reserve for more wildflower carpets. Drive on to Eaglestone Rock and Lake Brown to explore the granite rock and salt lake, a great place for picnic lunch. Visit Mangowine Homestead to absorb the early settler history at this National Trust (WA) heritage farm. Open 1pm-4pm daily but CLOSED Wednesday.

A short drive further west is Billyacatting Hill Conservation Park and Yarragin Rock.

Some rock reserves have walk trails, picnic



WWII MILITARY SITE TRAIL

Some of the military sites can only be viewed from the roadside as they are on private property. Please respect the rights of these property owners.

Distance approx. 90kms return on sealed roads with some unsealed sections. Allow half a day.

During your stay in Merredin visit the Military Museum adjacent to Pioneer Park, the WWII Australian Army Hospital site at Merredin Peak Reserve, War Memorial Cenotaph on the corner of Barrack and Fifth Streets and the Long Tan Vietnam Memorial Reflection Pond in King Street near the Shire admin building and Roy Little Park.



Heading north from Merredin on Telfer Avenue and then Merredin-Chandler Road to see a concrete igloo structure in the paddock on the right-hand side. This building was originally a WWII High Frequency Direction Finding Installation base.

Continue north and turn left on the Nokaning East Road (10km unsealed) several kilometres along you will see the remnants of the RAAF No.6 Central Reserve Munitions Depot where another 46 of these concrete igloo structures were built to house munitions. From the roadside you can still see some of the numbers written on the doors.

Follow Nokaning East Road until you reach the Merredin-Nungarin Road and turn north for 25kms to Nungarin. Visit the extensive vehicle and machinery collection at Nungarin Heritage Machinery and Army Museum (open daily) located in the WWII Maintenance Workshops constructed between 1942 and 1946.

Just west of Nungarin on the Nungarin-Wyalkatchem Road out in the paddock to the left is the remnants of the brick dividing fire walls of an additional five large Army store houses. The construction of the fire walls with steel reinforcing rods remains as testament to the Army's building methods employed at the time.

Nungarin has a hotel, store and monthly Wheatbelt Markets (1st Sunday March-December).

If time permits, travel 14kms north to historic Mangowine Homestead a National Trust (WA) site and an RV Friendly Destination where the onsite caretaker will show you through the historic homestead and outbuildings, the original CWA building, stone lined wells and walk trails to take in the history.

Returning via the Merredin-Nungarin Road, approaching Merredin are two large iron clad hanger structures located on the left. These were the RAAF No.10 Stores Depot built in 1943 and part of the depot for bulk and technical stores, including vehicle parts, uniforms, aircraft parts and equipment required by the Airforce.

This site is now home to a private business and can only be viewed from the roadside.
