THE 1936 CBH WHEAT BIN

Our main museum building is the original 1936 “K” type wheat bin which is believed to be the oldest in preservation. It is one of our Heritage Listed Exhibits that displays the construction skills and practical innovation that were evident early in the last century.

The “Wheat Bin” displays a collection of Vintage Vehicles, Horse and Wagon equipment, Agricultural Tools & Machinery from our past.

Graham & Paul’s sheds walks you through an agricultural history from road making to land clearing, cultivation & harvesting.



SCHOOL-HOUSE MUSEUM
